Class Teachers are responsible for the orderly dismissal of pupils from their classrooms. Where a person other than a child's parent is collecting a child from school, we need to have their name and phone number in advance.

Important

Parents/Carers, please can you write your <u>child's name</u> on all their clothing, book bags and water bottles, as all the children have the same clothes/ bags and it is very hard to work out which child it belongs to.

Also children really need to be able to identify their written name. There is plenty of opportunity for them to see their written name in the classroom - on peg and tray labels, self-registration, books, etc but they need a lot of practise. We do not want the children to use other people's things, especially their water bottles.

Reading

All children have been given a reading book and a Reading Record. It is important for children to understand how to look after a book and the features e.g. front cover, back cover and the title. The children would be practising turning one page at a time. This is an important aspect to teach children about reading books.

Topic

This term our topic is - All About Me.

Please have a discussion about our senses. For example, we use our ears to listen, our eyes to see and nose to smell.

Additionally, we have been learning to count our body parts. For example, we have 2 eyes, 1 nose and 2 ears.

Literacy

Our class literacy book this half term is 'Mixed' by Arree Chung.

<u>Homework</u> - Discuss feelings that are displayed in the story book. For example, Yellow was being kind to Blue and they became friends. Yellow made Blue happy by talking to Blue.

Phonics

This week we have been looking at letter sounds I, N, M and D. Next week we will be moving onto G, O, C, and K.

See if your child can spot these letters whilst you are out and about at the weekend.

Maths

This week we have been practising writing numbers 0-10.

<u>Homework</u> - Ask your children to help you with your grocery shopping. Ask them to put away the oranges and ask them how many oranges are in the bag? Practise counting objects correctly, using their finger to point to each object, and to count the numbers slowly, one count per object.



National Coding Week

We have been celebrating National Coding Week this week. We programmed the Beebots to reach different spaces on our carpet. We had so much FUN!
